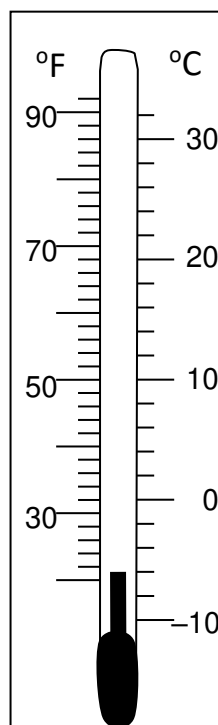

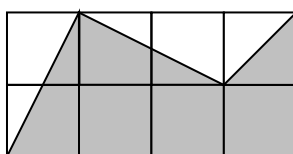

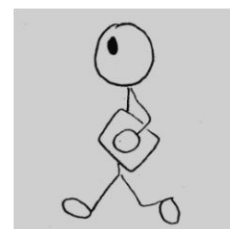

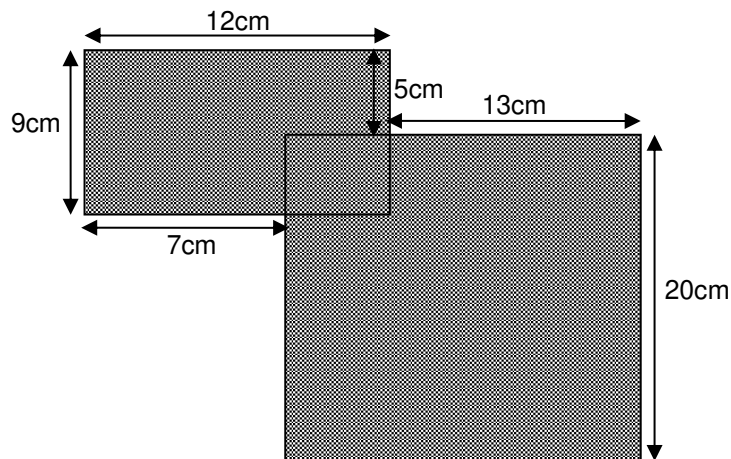

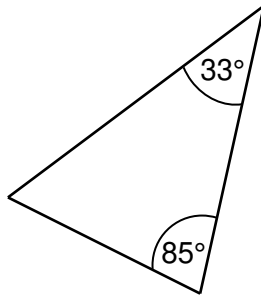

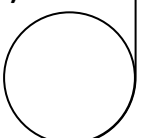

*A perfect number is a number whose factors (not including itself) add up to itself.
e.g. 6 is a perfect number because $1 + 2 + 3 = 6$.*

(vii) Powerful numbers?

*A powerful number has the property that for **every** prime number which divides into it, that **prime** number squared also divides into it.
e.g. 16 is a powerful number because both 2 and 2^2 are factors.*
